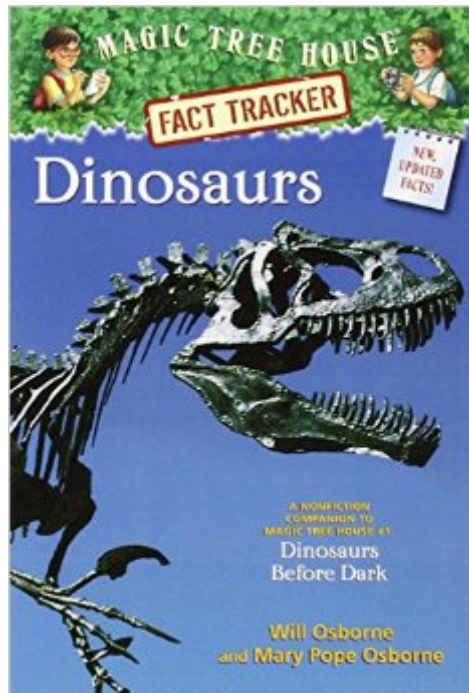

This book is actually interesting to read. My son very much prefers fiction over non-fiction, but both of us enjoyed reading this book. The reading level is probably a year or two higher than the regular series, so while my son reads those books on his own, I read this one to him. I liked it enough that I plan on buying more Fact

We love all the research guides for MTH. They are written at a higher Lexile level than the stories but it makes them fun to read together. My 6 year old doesn't have the patience to read through a research guide the entire way through on her own but together it makes for a fun project...she gets to tell me about what happened in the story to Jack & Annie and together we learn some fun facts about whatever time/place the story was about.

This series is fantastic! My daughter sat and read 3 of them through all by herself. She's 8 and in 3rd grade. I would call this series essential to all classrooms second-6th grade. Packed with really interesting info in bite-sized sections.
